


Our mission: All students attending the Oak Hills Local School District achieve success by graduating with individual skills for career and college readiness and global competence.



Fiscal Stewardship

Financial responsibility ensures that the majority of funding is spent on classroom instruction.



The Auditor of State Office presented the Oak Hills Local School District the Ohio Auditor of State Award with Distinction at the District's May 2016 Board meeting.

"Based upon your recently completed financial audit, it gives me great pleasure to inform you that the Oak Hills Local School District has received the Auditor of State Award with Distinction," Dave Yost, Auditor of State, commented. "Clean and accurate record-keeping are the foundation for good government and the taxpayers can take pride in the District's commitment to accountability."

Energy Savings


The district partnered with Energy Optimizers, USA, to launch an ambitious \$4 million energy conservation project, as part of HB 264. The project is expected to generate at least \$373,835 in savings annually. The savings will be recognized in the district's general fund on utility and related maintenance costs, assuming usage consumption and utility rates remain

at current levels. The project aims to improve the comfort, control and reliability of the district's HVAC and lighting systems while significantly reducing operational costs. In total, 11 buildings were improved, including the district's central office and the bus garage.

Access to Mental Health Services

Oak Hills has partnered with Cincinnati Children's Hospital to provide access to mental health services at all three of our middle schools as well as the high school.



Furry Friends

Oakdale Elementary partnered with Therapy Pets of Greater Cincinnati to set up a program at the school with animal-assisted activity visits to the specialized classrooms. These classrooms are designed to support the academic, social and emotional needs of

individual students. Therapy teams consist of two registered handlers with TPGC and their dogs.

A well-rounded education includes a wide variety of opportunities.




STUDENT ACTIVITIES

There are three student exchange opportunities in Guatemala, Germany and France.

We have 26 varsity athletic teams at the high school and 16 athletic teams at the middle school level.

There are a variety of activities and clubs at all levels. Among students in 4th-8th grade, 65% participate in student activities. In grades 9-12, 50% of students participate in student activities.

The OHHS Cheerleading Competition Team competed in the 24th Annual OASSA Cheer and Dance State Championships held in Columbus, Ohio in March 2016 and scored first place.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Students have the opportunity to supplement their classroom learning experiences by engaging in community service opportunities, extra-curricular and co-curricular activities.

High school students also have the opportunity to participate in a Capstone Project through our Programs of Study - STEMM, International Studies, Creative and Performing Arts and Integrated Studies. Through the Programs of Study Initiative, students can focus in an area of interest and can earn college credit through the College Credit Plus program in partnership with the University of Cincinnati, Cincinnati State and Sinclair College. In addition, many of our senior students participate in internship programs with local business and organizations to assist them in their preparation for their college/university experience or chosen field of study.



We are pleased that many of our students districtwide participate in community service activities,

such as Relay For Life, Games for the Cure, Autism Walk, Teal Out and Annual OHHS Walk to raise funds for local charities and organizations.

Students at the high school can choose from over 48 different clubs and activities, while middle school students



are offered 15 different clubs and activities.

Hour of Code

In partnership with the University of Cincinnati and Code.org, OHHS was able to host the community event, "Hour of Code" which offered an introduction to computer science. The program was designed to demystify code and show that anyone can master the basics. Three other district buildings also held similar events.

this spring. The items were recycled and kept out of the landfills. The effort would not have been possible without the help of the OHHS football team who unloaded the cars for guests.



Giving Back

The Oak Hills Local School District was busy working to end heart disease by raising money and awareness at eight of the district's schools. From jump rope to mat ball, each school held fitness events during the class day to raise money and help support heart health. As a result of student participation, these events raised \$31,947 for the American Heart Association. Great job, Highlanders!

Community Service

OHHS students raised awareness about hunger, homelessness, and taking action to help those in need in our community. The city-wide event, sponsored by the Greater Cincinnati Homeless Coalition and the Mayerson Service Learning Program, hosted 80 Highlander juniors and seniors, who slept in a shantytown in the school courtyard. The event helped to then spur on several food drives held at the high school. In other service project

The safety and security of our staff and students is our #1 priority.



Bullying Prevention

The school counselor, Amy Hauer, visited all K-2 classrooms at J.F. Dulles with the story, "Spookley the Square Pumpkin," in honor of Bully Prevention month in October 2015. Students designed their own pumpkin in any shape, size or color to add to the J.F. Dulles pumpkin patch in the hallway with the message, "We Stand Out Together." Dulles is also celebrating Unity Day next week in honor of bully prevention. Check out the creative and different pumpkins – all unique in their own special way like our students .



In addition to reporting bullying issues directly to building principals, students and parents can report bullying instances using our free district app. The app allows individuals to include photos as well as contact information, or you can remain anonymous.

School Access Protocol

In the Oak Hills Local School District we strive to make sure that our schools are safe, caring, healthy and inclusive places in which to learn and work. Fire drills, visitor badges/sign in and other safety and security protocols and practices are important components of our commitment to maintaining a safe and secure school environment. All staff wear ID badges and visitors must be buzzed in and stop at the main office before entering any building, as doors are locked.

A.L.I.C.E.

The district has partnered with both Green and Delhi Township police departments to provide ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter and Evacuate) training to all students and staff. ALICE focuses on teaching critical thinking and proactive survival skills in active shooter scenarios. Meet Atticus

In 2013 the district introduced 60-pound Dutch-Shepherd, Atticus, to the safety team. He spends his days at OHHS searching inside the building, hallways and the parking lot. He's been taught to be friendly with staff and students, but was trained not to be a distraction to students on campus. Atticus is trained to detect drugs and fire arms and can take down an attacker by command of his handler.
